


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Photo (Top): His Honour the Honourable Norman Kwong, Lieutenant Governor and Premier Stelmach exit the Chamber following Royal Assent.

An Introduction

The origins of Alberta's Legislative Assembly Office (LAO) can be traced to 14th century England, when Parliament elected the first Speaker and appointed the first Clerk. Today the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly is the head of the LAO, and the Clerk is the Speaker's deputy. The *Legislative Assembly Act of 1983* made the LAO's current name official.

The most common misconception about the LAO is that it is a branch of government and that its staff are government employees. However, in the parliamentary system the government is the executive branch, responsible for applying and enforcing laws; the Legislative Assembly is the legislative branch, responsible for establishing those laws. The Legislative Assembly Office provides various types of support to the entire Assembly, both Members of government and opposition caucuses.

Although the LAO is sometimes called the Speaker's department, it is not a government department. The Speaker does not belong to the cabinet and cannot be asked questions during Oral Question Period or participate in the Assembly's debates. However, the Speaker does have administrative authority and responsibility similar to that of a minister of a government department. The Clerk is the Speaker's chief administrative deputy and has authority and responsibility similar to that of a deputy minister.

The Speaker has two distinct but related roles. In the Assembly the Speaker maintains order and ensures that Members of the Legislative Assembly conduct their business according to the Standing Orders of the Assembly.

Administratively the Speaker is responsible for the Assembly's records and for ensuring the provision of a range of services

to Members and the public. This includes financial administration, human resource management, technological support, security, public education programming, purchasing, communications, library, legal and parliamentary services.

The LAO as a whole has the same procedural and administrative roles. This is a unique characteristic and is evident throughout the office, particularly during session, when the normal duties, work hours and office locations of many staff change significantly.

The LAO's annual budget as well as provisions for financial and human resource administration are under the purview of the Special Standing Committee on Members' Services. As an all-party committee of the Assembly the Members' Services Committee regulates constituency office support and Members' pay, allowances, benefits and group insurance plans, all of which the LAO administers. Traditionally the Speaker chairs the Members' Services Committee.

Each party of elected Members, or caucus, is a branch of the LAO. Although the Speaker technically has authority over the administration of each caucus office, for obvious reasons these branches operate with considerable autonomy. Therefore, the caucus branches are not part of this report; it includes only branches of the LAO under the Speaker's full control. However, since the caucuses receive financial, administrative, research and human resource services as well as other support from other branches of the LAO, this report does comment on those services. In addition, the office's consolidated budget estimates and audited financial statements, which appear at the end of this report, include caucus finances.

Services

Office of the Clerk

Responsible for processing the daily business of the House and providing management and communications support to all branches of the LAO.

The Clerk acts as a liaison at the deputy minister level with government departments and assists in co-ordinating Member participation in interparliamentary activities.

Financial Management and Administrative Services (FMAS)

Provides full accounting services such as budget preparation and monitoring, payment processing and financial reporting as well as administrative services, including equipment and supply procurement, telecommunications management, constituency office leasing and credit card administration. FMAS also handles the responsibilities under the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* and Records Management Guidelines for the LAO.

Human Resource Services (HRS)

Advises on employment and policy issues for the Speaker, Members, caucuses, constituencies and the LAO as well as manages the Legislative Assembly human resource and payroll system, including co-ordinating MLA and staff compensation plans and administering employee and service contracts. In addition, HRS oversees the recruitment and retention policies for nonpartisan positions, co-ordinates career counseling and learning and development programs, ensures safe work practices and promotes health and wellness initiatives.

Information Technology Services (ITS)

ITS is dedicated to providing all technology services to the Speaker, Members, caucuses and constituency offices.

ITS places a major emphasis on supporting the technology interdependencies between clients and ensures that the operation of all services, including network infrastructure, application development, hardware and software, is reliable and operational.

Legal Services – Parliamentary Counsel

Provide legal advice on a wide range of matters, including parliamentary procedure, and draft private Members' public bills and private bills. Both Senior Parliamentary Counsel serve as Table Officers in the House and advise the Speaker on points of order and questions of privilege.

Library Services

Offers information, news and reference and research services to the Members, their staff and policy field committees using current library and information technology. As well, Library Services provides training in the use of services that are delivered electronically to the Members' desktops.

House Services

Along with providing advice on parliamentary procedure, producing the Votes and Proceedings, Order Paper, the *Journal* and assisting in maintaining House records such as bills and motions,

House Services provides all arrangements for the Assembly's standing, special standing and select special committee meetings and assists with expenses, budgets, historical records and transcripts relating to committees. In addition, the recording and publishing of print and electronic versions of *Alberta Hansard*, the official report of the proceedings of the Legislative Assembly and its committees, fall under the responsibility of House Services. This includes the administration of a subscription service to *Alberta Hansard*, Votes and Proceedings and bills and the printing and distribution of sessional publications. The *Hansard* staff in the House Services Branch also provide proofreading and editing services to other branches.

Visitor, Ceremonial and Security Services (VCSS)

Plans and executes ceremonial and special events as well as the co-ordination of school and public outreach programs, tours of the facilities and delivery of educational and orientation materials. VCSS is also responsible for exhibits and the Legislature Assembly Gift Shop. Maintaining security in the Chamber and precincts, co-ordinating security for constituency offices and managing the Alberta Legislative Assembly Page program are also responsibilities of VCSS.

Key Responsibility Areas

YEAR-AT-A-GLANCE

The Legislative Assembly Office (LAO) began 2007 by coordinating staff changes and office moves as a result of the leadership review in December 2006.

The new sitting of the Legislature brought temporary changes to the Standing Orders affecting the hours of House operation and establishing four new standing committees. Effects of the new committees were felt organization-wide as the necessary services to support the new committees were implemented.

As well, 100 Years of Democracy celebrations wrapped with the eagerly awaited unveiling in May of *The Centennial Series*, a four-volume set of Alberta legislative history produced in commemoration of the centennial of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta. In addition, the Historical Vignette Collection was sent to production in late fall.

As the year came to a close, focus shifted to preparations in anticipation of an early 2008 election call.

AREA I

Provision of Timely, Professional, Impartial, Accurate Information and Advice to Members

Information

Several documents and records were updated as a result of changes to the Standing Orders approved during the spring sitting. This includes the Standing Orders, Members' Guide and Consolidated Members' Services Orders and the Practical Guide to Committees, which was extensively rewritten by House Services. House Services also created spreadsheets to assist committee clerks with tracking Committee of Supply cycles. In addition, Parliamentary Counsel provided drafting and procedural support in the preparation of amendments to the Standing Orders and the Members' Services Committee Orders.

Various LAO documents and databases were also updated as a result of two June 2007 by-elections. As well, branches assisted constituency staff during the period of time where there were vacancies in the two electoral divisions and oriented the new Members' following the by-elections. Similarly, House Services and Parliamentary Counsel held an orientation for the Chairs and Deputy Chairs of the four new standing committees.


In anticipation of a general election call, the Legislative Assembly Office updated the dissolution guidelines and forms and processes associated with dissolution and postelection activities. As well, various orientation materials were updated by Communications Services, and Library Services updated the electoral division information packages for each of the 83 constituencies.

With the assistance of Parliamentary Counsel standard constituency office lease agreements and lease amending agreements were updated by FMAS, who also updated the user guidelines to accompany Members' AMEX corporate credit cards and Expenditure Guidelines for Members of the Legislative Assembly.

House Services continued to meet and exceed all *Hansard* publication and delivery targets in 2007, including publishing on a substantially next-day basis the more than doubled committee workload over the previous year, some meetings of which were held in out-of-town locations. Over 700 speech reprints for Members were produced in paper, electronic and audio format.

The library collection as a whole grew by approximately 2 per cent, which included subscriptions to 18 new periodical and newspaper titles. In addition, the Alberta Electronic Government Documents Archive was expanded to include 3,280 documents, a 24 per cent increase over the previous year.

Bibliographies on topics such as affordable housing, aging workforce, committees, ethics, growth pressures, immigration, legislative process and procedures, nuclear energy, royalties, sustainable and renewable resources and traffic safety were prepared by Library Services before session.

In addition, Library Services continued microfilming weekly newspapers and compiling New Books in the Library (NBIL), Selected Periodical Articles in the Library (SPAL), Ministers and Critics and Canadian Legislation alerting services.

Advice

Human Resource Services (HRS) conferred with Members on pay and benefits adjustments following the cabinet shuffle. Following further implementation of the constituency compensation plan, HRS advised Members regarding employee compensation issues and options on transition to the new system. HRS also advised Members in carrying out their supervisory role on issues relating to performance management, employee development, employee relations and contract administration.

In addition to providing advice via telephone and e-mail, the Sergeant-at-Arms or the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms personally visited 33 constituency offices to offer advice on constituency office safety as well as personal safety.

FMAS provided advice regarding changes to Members' Services Committee orders affecting Members' allowances and entitlements as well as provided advice to Members and constituency staff on Member/constituency websites and drafted guidelines for Member/constituency websites with the assistance of LAO management. Additionally,

FMAS provided advice on best practices for Members' records organization and disposition and assisted with disposition of Members' records as requested. FMAS also liaised with legislative offices staff regarding budget and reporting practices and other common financial issues.

Communications Services provided communications planning and counsel as well as media relations and advertising expertise to legislative committees in support of public consultation initiatives. New websites were built for all committees.

Parliamentary Counsel responded to questions from Members, caucus and constituency office staff on a variety of legal and procedural issues and presented briefings to constituency office and caucus staff on procedural matters and legal issues. Together with House Services, Parliamentary Counsel continued to provide procedural advice, guidance and research to the Speaker and Members of the Assembly and to fulfill their roles as Table Officers.

AREA 2

Provision of Services, Equipment, Supplies and Facilities on a Timely Basis

Online Services

The Legislative Assembly's internal website, OurHouse, was redeveloped and redesigned using Microsoft SharePoint platform to assist in delivering collaborative resources to LAO employees in a user-friendly format. Management and staff from various branches as well as constituency and caucus offices participated in test groups and consultation meetings for the rebuild. The project was the result of collaboration between Information Technology Services (ITS) and Communications Services.

ITS and House Services joined forces to extend online audiostreaming capability to webcast legislative committee activity. The second phase of this project saw access to the web streaming of Assembly

proceedings and committee activity made easier with a redesign on the Legislative Assembly website. The new format displays information in a calendar, allowing easy access to both current and past events. This redesign was the result of collaboration between Communications Services and ITS.

HRS co-ordinated the redesign and rewrite of the Jobs section of the Legislative Assembly website. As well, HRS noticed an increase in course registrations following efforts to improve online access to career supports and learning and development opportunities.

FMAS completed drafting a strategic plan for the LAO's information and records management (IRM) program, recruited an IRM advisor, began work with Communications Services on an IRM communications strategy, which included developing a subsite on OurHouse, and began the LAO's records classification project.

FMAS participated in the improvement, testing and implementation of a new version of the online ordering system for overprinted materials by Members, caucus, branch and constituency staff.

Library Services enhanced its collection of databases to include Business Source Complete and Canada Info Desk as well as added to its Conference Board of Canada subscriptions to include Canadian Industrial Trends: Natural Gas and Canadian Industrial Trends: Crude Oil Services. As well, the digitization of Scrapbook *Hansard* continued and currently the digital collection comprises 6,626 newspaper articles spanning 21 years of Alberta's legislative history.

Facilities

Access to emergency equipment and services was enhanced as, in partnership with Infrastructure and Transportation, the LAO installed automated external defibrillators (AEDs) throughout the Legislature Building and Annex. These units are fully automated and are intended for use by individuals with or without training in the event of an on-site cardiac emergency.

Basic first aid kits were installed in various common areas of the Legislature Annex as well as in the Visitor Services office. First aid kits were also provided to each constituency office and to each MLA for use in his/her vehicle, and first aid training was co-ordinated for staff.

The Legislative Assembly security staff provided security services to all standing committees, screening visitors and ensuring the safety and security of all committee members, staff, media and others who were in attendance.

The Legislative Assembly Security Services acquired a new province-wide communications system for first responders (police, fire, EMS, et cetera) set to go into service in 2009. As well, the office of the SAA continued to co-ordinate the maintenance of all alarm systems in the 83-plus constituency offices.

Communications Services wrote a strategic communications plan for the Pandemic Planning Committee to supplement the LAO's pandemic plan. Representatives of various branches are on the committee, which is chaired by the Sergeant-at-Arms/Director of VCSS.

The SAA/Director of VCSS continued to serve on the Security Co-ordination Committee to discuss and co-ordinate security issues relating to the Legislature Building and surrounding areas. This committee is comprised of security stakeholders drawn from the LAO, Alberta Solicitor General and Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation.

VCSS provided security for Members and the nearly 13,000 spectators that were seated in the galleries during the 2007 session. As well, VCSS assisted with the co-ordination of four model parliaments and other events held in the Chamber and within the precincts of the Legislature.

With the assistance of Communications Services VCSS produced new promotional materials for the Gift Shop, including shopping bags, gift certificates and envelopes. Visitor Services also assisted with site preparations for Legislative

Assembly and department functions hosted in the Interpretive Centre, pedway and Legislature Grounds.

General Services

House Services continued to provide administrative and procedural support to legislative committees, including the four new standing committees established during the spring sitting. In response to the increased workload House Services modernized its committee processes to increase efficiency. This included moving to paperless, web-based committee documentation for reports, submissions, news releases, agendas and notices for both internal and external users.

The 11-Member all-party Select Special Personal Information Protection Act Review Committee that was established during the 2006 spring session tabled its final report on November 14, 2007.

As a result of the expanded mandate of the Standing Committee on Public Accounts, House Services provided support for 23 meetings, almost double the usual 12. As well, several meetings took place outside of session. Support was also provided by House Services to the committee's research subcommittee. Extensive liaison with regional health authorities and advanced education institutions enabled the committee to function effectively.

In its support of the new standing committees Library Services produced 46 research documents, including briefings, research papers and cross-jurisdictional comparisons. Additionally, Library Services completed summaries of written and oral submissions and assisted in the drafting of three final reports. Library Services also prepared 12 documents for the Public Accounts Committee.

Legislative committees continued to receive support in the areas of legal and procedural guidance from Parliamentary Counsel, communications expertise with regard to planning, advertising and media relations from Communications Services and security support from VCSS.

In addition to preparing the annual financial statements and assisting auditors with information in the course of the audit, FMAS staff prepared information and liaised with staff from the office of the Auditor General on a special Members' entitlements audit.

Parliamentary Counsel continued to provide legal drafting services in the preparation of private Members' public bills (16 introduced), private bills (two introduced), and reviewed amendments, private members' motions, motions for returns, written questions and petitions as well as a wide array of contracts/agreements: licensing, leases, employment and fee-for-service contracts and other service arrangements.

In addition, Parliamentary Counsel organized seminars for Members on the duties of notaries public and commissioners for oaths with the Department of Justice and prepared the annual list of required tablings and circulated it to all Members, officers of the Legislature and senior officials throughout government prior to session.

Speech writing services for various Legislative Assembly functions and ceremonies were provided by Communications Services and the Sergeant-at-Arms' office.

Throughout the year Communications Services worked on 552 projects in support of various LAO initiatives. In addition, a new visual identity was developed for the Legislative Assembly of Alberta. Guidelines directing usage of the new identity were drafted, and both the guidelines and visual identity were made available online. Following the development of the visual identity, various publications were updated.

House Services continued to support other branches by providing proofreading services for documents, including private members' bills, Standing Orders and other publications produced by the LAO.

The Alberta Electronic Government Documents Archive, developed and

maintained by Library Services, expanded to include 3,280 documents, increasing the size of this collection by 24 per cent over the previous year.

The Library's Profiles service provides e-mail updates of newspaper and periodical articles to Members and LAO staff who are following particular issues. This year 18 different topics of interest were monitored.

Equipment and Supplies

Information Technology Services (ITS) in collaboration with House Services implemented a new digital audio recording and transcription system for transcribing House proceedings and both on-site and off-site committee meetings. This new system lays the groundwork for future audio and video enhancements.

In another collaborative effort, ITS and House Services developed a web-based program containing all Speakers' rulings and a subject index to the rulings. Future plans include making the program searchable, a valuable resource for Table Officers. Additionally, with the assistance of ITS, House Services also improved the functionality of the bills and amendments application by adding subamendment tracking and reporting. House Services also streamlined the publishing of bound volumes of committee transcripts by switching to an electronic process.

Subsequent to the summer 2007 cabinet shuffle FMAS assisted with budget adjustments, set-up and reconfiguration of telecommunications services for Members and staff, provision or moves of Members' furniture, liaised with Service Alberta for the updating of Members' telephone directory listings and assisted in procuring new, overprinted stationery.

ITS co-ordinated the installation of new multifunction devices capable of colour printing, scanning, faxing and photocopying. Also, in an effort to improve security of LAO equipment and data, ITS implemented a series of hardware, software and policy

initiatives. ITS also acquired equipment and established protocols for working remotely. Wireless access, laptops and security provisioning have been deployed to MLAs and key stakeholders within the LAO.

FMAS maintained constituency office furniture following the upgrade project and planned and implemented the third phase of the Members' Legislature office furniture upgrade project. Additionally, in conjunction with ITS, FMAS developed a data capture system to assist in the valuation of assets.

ITS helped establish access to purchasing plans offering reduced rates on software used at the office for Members and staff, and in conjunction with FMAS and HRS updated the financial and payroll application process and deployed new cheque printing processes.

AREA 3

Provision of an Effective Workplace to Support Members

HRS initiated a review of the Legislative Assembly business intelligence components of the payroll system to streamline reporting and access to information on the system. This review is expected to progress over the course of the next two to three years.

It was a busy year for recruiting, with an over 800 per cent increase in the number of resumés received and reviewed. The response rate increase was due in part to targeted recruitment efforts and marketing the LAO as a desirable public service employer. Similarly, HRS enhanced the employee orientation program and developed a Legislature Page orientation program. Further efforts regarding employment included marketing internal career opportunities as a means to further develop staff and encourage career paths within the LAO, which resulted in promotions for seven employees.

As well, following the success of a pilot program in 2006, a revised performance management system emphasizing individual achievements and a commitment to formal learning plans was rolled out to remaining branches by HRS. In response to Alberta's current low unemployment/highly competitive labour market, classification reviews were conducted on both an individual and a branch basis to ensure that the skills and abilities required to perform specialized jobs are recognized.

Effective January 1, 2007, the Members' Services Committee approved learning and wellness accounts for Members and employees of the LAO. Within the first month 12 staff information sessions were conducted, and 486 claims were processed in the first fiscal year of the program.

The new Employee Family Assistance Program (EFAP), provided through the public service, was introduced to staff as a confidential service designed to assist employees and their immediate family who experience personal problems and require private counselling. The employee assistance and recovery program (EARP) supported employees on extended absences from work and co-ordinated successful return-to-work programs when employees were ready to return.

Safety

A significant step towards workplace health and safety, the Legislative Assembly of Alberta Health & Safety Guide was developed. This guide is an amalgamation of information initially developed for the web and provides easy access to safety tips, ergonomic solutions, wellness and emergency preparedness information for Members and staff of the LAO. The guide was produced by HRS in co-operation with Communications Services.

In addition, ergonomic orientations and workstation assessments were conducted by HRS in an effort to prevent workplace injury, and the immunization program and floor warden systems, including evacuation drills, were maintained.

VCSS in co-operation with HRS arranged for all Legislative Assembly Security Services staff to be recertified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and automated external defibrillator (AED) and trained in basic defensive tactics as part of a two-day training course.

AREA 4

Provision of Support to Maintain and Develop the Parliamentary System in Alberta

Parliamentary Counsel monitored national and international legal actions that affected the rights and immunities of Members and defended the interests of the Assembly when required. Parliamentary Counsel and House Services continued their partnership as Alberta correspondents for the *Parliamentary Review* and the *Table Review*.

The Sergeant-at-Arms (SAA) gave advice to the office of the Lieutenant Governor on matters relating to protocol.

Communications Services continued to oversee the television broadcasting of Assembly proceedings and worked with other branches of the LAO toward future developments and needs assessment.

House Services assisted in planning the business agenda of the annual conference of the Hansard Association of Canada and delivered a presentation on Alberta's in-house project to digitize back issues of *Hansard* transcripts.

The Clerk Assistant/Director of House Services continued to act as administrative secretary to the Alberta branch of the Assemblée parlementaire de la Francophonie (APF) and worked with Communications Services to invite submissions from Alberta artists for the production of a gift to be presented to the Quebec National Assembly in celebration of the 400th anniversary of the city of Quebec in 2008.

In addition, the LAO assisted in the recruitment of House of Commons pages by conducting interviews with applicants from across Alberta.

Educational Outreach/ Programming

In partnership with Alberta Education phase 2 of the Virtual Visit was developed.

VCSS continued to co-ordinate tours of the Legislature and precincts as well as provide support to all Legislative Assembly events. In support of the educational programs offered by the Legislative Assembly, VCSS formed a provincial Education Advisory Committee (EAC) of teachers and consultants at all levels for the purpose of meeting biannually to review Visitor Services' school programming and offer recommendations. VCSS increased contact with various tourism agencies in Alberta and Canada.

The LAO continued to bring together Members and students in meaningful and educational ways through the School at the Legislature program, which hosted 34 classes with a total of 828 students, and Mr. Speaker's MLA for a Day program, which was attended by 65 high school students from across the province. More on this and other events in the events section.

VCSS had a number of displays produced featuring the variety of programs and services offered by the Legislative Assembly to be showcased in the Legislature pedway.

On May 31, 2007, the Legislature Library hosted a formal presentation of the book *Fuelling Progress: A History of the Canadian Gas Association* to Speaker Kowalski by ATCO Gas President Jerome Engler and Canadian Gas Association chief executive officer Michael Cleland. The book examines the first 100 years of the Canadian Gas Association and covers the history of the gas industry and Canadian energy policy.

Community Initiatives

VCSS co-ordinated travelling exhibits in the pedway and Interpretive Centre: From the Ground Up, Then and Now, Icons of George Weber and Princess Louise - A Woman of Substance. VCSS contracted a comprehensive five-month visitor survey over the heavy tourism season, and the responses indicated a 97 per cent visitor satisfaction rate. Further to this, VCSS was a finalist for the prestigious ALTO Award for Service Excellence, an annual award presented by Travel Alberta. In addition, VCSS attended various teachers' conventions and conferences, including the Alberta Teachers' Association social studies



conference, to promote the educational programs offered by the Legislative Assembly. VCSS welcomed teachers from regional teachers' conventions and from the summer institute for social studies teachers for special tours and presentations in the Chamber.

The LAO once again organized events and initiatives to raise funds in support of the United Way. The creative efforts of the volunteer staff earned a bronze citation.

Library Services provided a series of orientation sessions to the press gallery staff, postsecondary and graduate students of library studies as well as to employees from the Auditor General's office and ATCO. Parliamentary Counsel also accepted speaking engagements with postsecondary institutions.

Associations

The LAO is actively involved in national and international associations that not only support and maintain the parliamentary system in Alberta

but provide the opportunity for skill development and networking as well.

The Alberta/National Conference of State Legislatures Energy Symposium was held in Edmonton. Various branches, including House Services, the office of the Clerk and Communications Services, worked with the Office of the Speaker to ensure the conference was a success.

Publications/Educational Materials

The Historical Vignette Collection was completed. This publication commemorates the centennial of the province, 2005, and the Legislative Assembly of Alberta's 100 Years of Democracy, 2006, through a compilation of vignettes delivered to the House. This project was spearheaded by the Speaker's Office and produced by the Office of the Clerk and Communications Services in conjunction with House Services and the Legislature Library.

Library Services in conjunction with Communications Services completed the production of *The Centennial Series*, a four-volume set commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta in 2006, and coordinated an unveiling ceremony with the assistance of House Services and VCSS.

VCSS worked with Library Services, House Services and Communications Services on a review and update of *The Citizen's Guide to the Alberta Legislature* and on a brochure for the Legislature Grounds tour.

NOTE 1

Authority

The Legislative Assembly Office (the "Office") is operated under the authority of the *Legislative Assembly Act*. Annual operating budgets are approved by the Special Standing Committee on Members' Services.

NOTE 2

Purpose

Within the traditions of parliamentary democracy as constitutionally established in Alberta, the Legislative Assembly Office will

1. Support the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly in carrying out the duties of office.
2. Support Members by providing services, advice, information and infrastructure required to carry out their roles as elected representatives.
3. Record the proceedings and maintain and preserve the records of the Legislative Assembly.

4. Inform and educate the public on behalf of Members and the institution of Parliament.
5. Provide a positive, productive, healthy and secure environment for Members and staff of the Assembly.
6. Support the Assembly in protecting its institutions and privileges.
7. Support the exchange of ideas/information among Parliaments.
8. Build partnerships with external clients in support of the institution of Parliament.

NOTE 3

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Reporting Practices

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles:



a) Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is the Legislative Assembly Office, for which the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly is responsible.

The Office operates within the General Revenue Fund (the "Fund"). The Fund is administered by the Minister of Finance. All receipts of the Office are deposited into the Fund and all disbursements made by the Office are paid from the Fund. The net transfer from the Fund is the difference between all cash receipts and all cash disbursements made.

b) Basis of Financial Reporting

REVENUES

All revenues are reported on the accrual basis of accounting.

Expenses

Expenses represent the costs of resources consumed during the year on the Office's operations.

Valuation Adjustments

Valuation adjustments include changes in the valuation

allowances used to reflect assets at their net recoverable or other appropriate value. Valuation adjustments also represent the change in management's estimate of future payments arising from obligations relating to vacation pay and transition allowance. Furthermore, accommodation costs, provided by Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation at no cost, are included in valuation adjustments so as to show the entire cost of the operation of the Office.

Assets

Financial assets of the Office are limited to financial claims such as cash, advances to and accounts receivable from other organizations, employers and other individuals.

Inventory held for resale is reported at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Capital assets of the Office are recorded at cost and amortized on a straight-line basis, over the estimated useful lives of the assets, invoiced at \$2,500 or greater, as follows:

Computer hardware and software	2 years
Office equipment	5 years
Furniture	10 years

The Office follows government budgetary practices that allow funds from an operating budget to be used to purchase capital assets. These purchases are included in expenses on the statement of operations but are then removed from expenses through a valuation adjustment and are capitalized and amortized over their useful lives.

The fair value of cash and accounts receivable and advances are estimated to approximate their book values.

Liabilities

Liabilities include all financial claims payable by the Office at fiscal year end.

The Members' transition allowance is estimated based on Members' years of service and their most recent remuneration amounts. The annual charge is the amount that is estimated to have been earned by Members during the year.

The fair values of accounts payable and accrued liabilities, vacation pay and Members' transition allowance are estimated to approximate their book values.

Net Liabilities

Net liabilities represent the difference between the value of assets held by the Office and its liabilities.

NOTE 5

Contribution from Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation

Included in the \$748,593 (2006 - \$875,312) contribution from Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation is: \$15,000 for renovations to the Legislature Committee Room A to increase capacity; and \$20,000 to fund a costing/functional study for the north-south pedway for potential redevelopment.

NOTE 6

Members' Transition Allowance

The Office implemented a Members' transition allowance on October 1, 1998. The provisions of the allowance were established in accordance with the Members' Allowances Order (RMSC 1992, c. M-1, as amended, Section 9.)

A transition allowance is paid to every Member at the time of dissolution of the Legislature unless they are re-elected in the next election. Members who resign their seats are also eligible for the allowance.

Under section 9, the amount paid for service commencing on or after March 20, 1989, is determined by multiplying three months' salary, based on the average monthly salary for the three calendar years in which the person received their highest salary, by the number of years the person served as a Member on or after March 20, 1989. "Salary" is defined in section 9(1). For service periods prior to March 20, 1989, the allowance is calculated by multiplying the highest rate of a Member's monthly indemnity and expense allowances for one month for every year of service prior to March 20, 1989 with no restrictions. There is no credit for years of service for which the Member has previously received a payment under Section 9 or the predecessor section. Eligible recipients may elect to be paid the allowance over a period of up to four years.

In the event of death of an active Member, a transition allowance equivalent to the amount owed at passing is paid to the Member's estate.

NOTE 7

Defined Benefit Plans

The Office participates in the following multi-employer pension plans: Management Employees Pension Plan and Public Service Pension Plan. The Office also participates in the multi-employer Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers. The expense for these pension plans is equivalent to the annual contributions of \$910,620 for the year ending March 31, 2007 (2006 - \$725,309).

At December 31, 2006, the Management Employees Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$6,765,000 (2005 – \$165,895,000) and the Public Service Pension Plan reported a surplus of \$153,024,000 (2005 – deficiency of \$187,704,000). At December 31, 2006, the Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers had a surplus of \$3,698,000 (2005- \$10,018,000).

The Office also participates in a multi-employer Long Term Disability Income Continuance Plan. At March 31, 2007, the Management, Opted Out and Excluded Plan reported an actuarial surplus of \$10,148,000 (2006- \$8,309,000). The expense for this plan is limited to employer's annual contributions for the year.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Speaker Ken Kowalski, President of the Alberta Branch of the CPA

Every year I am thankful for the opportunity to attend a variety of parliamentary conferences with my fellow MLAs. Even after over 25 years as a Member of the Legislative Assembly I continue to learn and grow from interparliamentary experiences. In fact, I was humbly inspired by a comment made by one of my fellow legislators at the 45th Commonwealth Parliamentary Association Canadian Regional Conference. He said, *“What binds us together are the values we share and our belief in democracy. We are united in our view that the only force that should be involved in achieving office should be the force of our arguments, and democracy is the best tool yet invented to unleash the talents of any country.”* Those are the profound words of the Rt. Hon. Greg Knight, representative for the U.K. branch of the CPA. Those values lie at the heart of our democratic parliamentary system, and as legislators it is our responsibility to ensure that those simple values are upheld and reflected in our every word and deed.

The conference featured eight business sessions covering a variety of topics. Topics that stood out in my mind dealt with youth voters and political apathy as well as reconciling free speech and fair trials.

Engaging youth in the democratic process has always been a topic of great interest to me. Through various programs and educational initiatives such as School at the Legislature for Grade 6 students and Mr. Speaker's MLA for a Day for Grade 10 students the Legislative Assembly of Alberta makes engaging Alberta's youth a

priority and attempts to plant the seeds for active citizenship and lifelong involvement.

The other session of great interest to me was Reconciling Free Speech and Fair Trials: What to Do When a Matter Is Before the Courts, presented by Graham Steele of Halifax and chaired by none other than Alberta MLA Mary Anne Jablonski. In his presentation Mr. Steele touched on the importance of not allowing the fact that a matter is before the courts to prevent legislators from discussing critical issues of interest to our constituents.

On another note, at the Canadian Regional Parliamentary Seminar held in Haines Junction, Yukon, from September 7 to 9, Rob Lougheed presented on initiatives relating to disability issues in the province of Alberta. The presentation examined the progress of disability issues across Canada, including physical access, housing, transportation and employment. With an aging population and less active lifestyles, current issues relating to disability will only become more prevalent and more urgent in the future. Applying a proactive approach to emerging constituent concerns today will hopefully allow legislators to iron out issues before they become urgent.

As always the conferences attended by MLAs in 2007 afforded boundless opportunities to learn from and network with other elected officials from across Canada and around the globe. Interparliamentary relations afford legislators the opportunity to evaluate issues on a larger scale and to learn from the experience of other jurisdictions.

In my role as Clerk I assist with the co-ordination of Member participation in interparliamentary activities. In 2007 Members attended a variety of conferences within Canada and throughout the world, some as far away as New Delhi, India, and others in our own backyard.

An energy symposium for the National Conference of State Legislatures was hosted by Speaker Kowalski in Edmonton from October 16 to 18 and attracted a number of senators and representatives from across the United States. The three-day event included a tour of the Oil Sands Discovery Centre in Fort McMurray, a panel discussion on labour force issues and presentations covering everything from environmental and regional issues of oil sands development to alternative renewable and nonrenewable energy development. My staff and I greatly enjoyed the opportunity to assist with this conference.

On another note, the 53rd Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference and the

Commonwealth Women Parliamentarians Conference, held in New Dehli from September 21 to 30, offered an incredible program filled with informative sessions and a wealth of culture and history.

The conference agenda featured an address by the Commonwealth Secretary-General and the Secretary-General of the CPA followed by the meeting of the Society of Clerks-at-the-Table. Founded in 1932 by Owen Clough, former Clerk of the Senate of South Africa, the object of the society is to provide a means by which parliamentary officials share knowledge of the practices and procedures of the various legislatures of the Commonwealth.





Hon. Speaker Kowalski presented an award on behalf of the Legislative Assembly to the student who best represented a facet of Alberta's parliamentary history.

May 30 – The Centennial Series Book Launch

The official launch of *The Centennial Series* was hosted by Speaker Kowalski on May 30 in the Legislature Rotunda. Among the 200 guests were His Honour the Honourable Lieutenant Governor Norman L. On June 4 Speaker Kowalski hosted a book launch in the Legislature Rotunda for *Finding Roberta MacAdams: A Writer's Journey Into the Great War*. The biographical novel about former Member of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta Roberta MacAdams was written by local author Debbie Marshall. Also participating in the ceremony was Hon. Fred Lindsay, Solicitor General and Minister of Public Security and MLA for Stony Plain. Roberta MacAdams was one of the first two women to serve as a Member of Parliament in the British Empire and to this day is the only woman representative ever elected by the armed services in the Commonwealth.

June 28 – Francophone Monument Unveiling

L'Empreinte Francophone (The French Imprint) was unveiled on the north Legislature Grounds on June 28, 2007, in a ceremony hosted by Speaker Kowalski. The monument was designed by Francophone artist Herman Poulin. The monument unites the Alberta wild rose and the Francophone fleur-de-lys as represented on the Franco-Albertan flag. The magnificent monument contains over 1,166 fingerprints of Francophones from across the province. The name L'Empreinte Francophone was suggested by José St-Laurent, a student at École Héritage in Falher, AB. She won a province-wide contest held among Francophone schools throughout Alberta.

July 1 – Canada Day

On July 1 the floor of the Chamber was open to visitors for the 10th annual Canada Day at the Legislature festivities. Over 7,200 visitors to the building were greeted by Legislature guides and Pages. The Clerk of the Assembly, Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms welcomed them in the Chamber. 
September 30 – Police and Peace Officers' Memorial Day

Nicole Stewart was invited by Speaker Kowalski to join the procession and then read her poem to the Assembly. Her presence on the dais was one of the




Photo (Top): His Honour the Honourable Norman L. Kwong, Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, during Opening Day ceremonies.
