

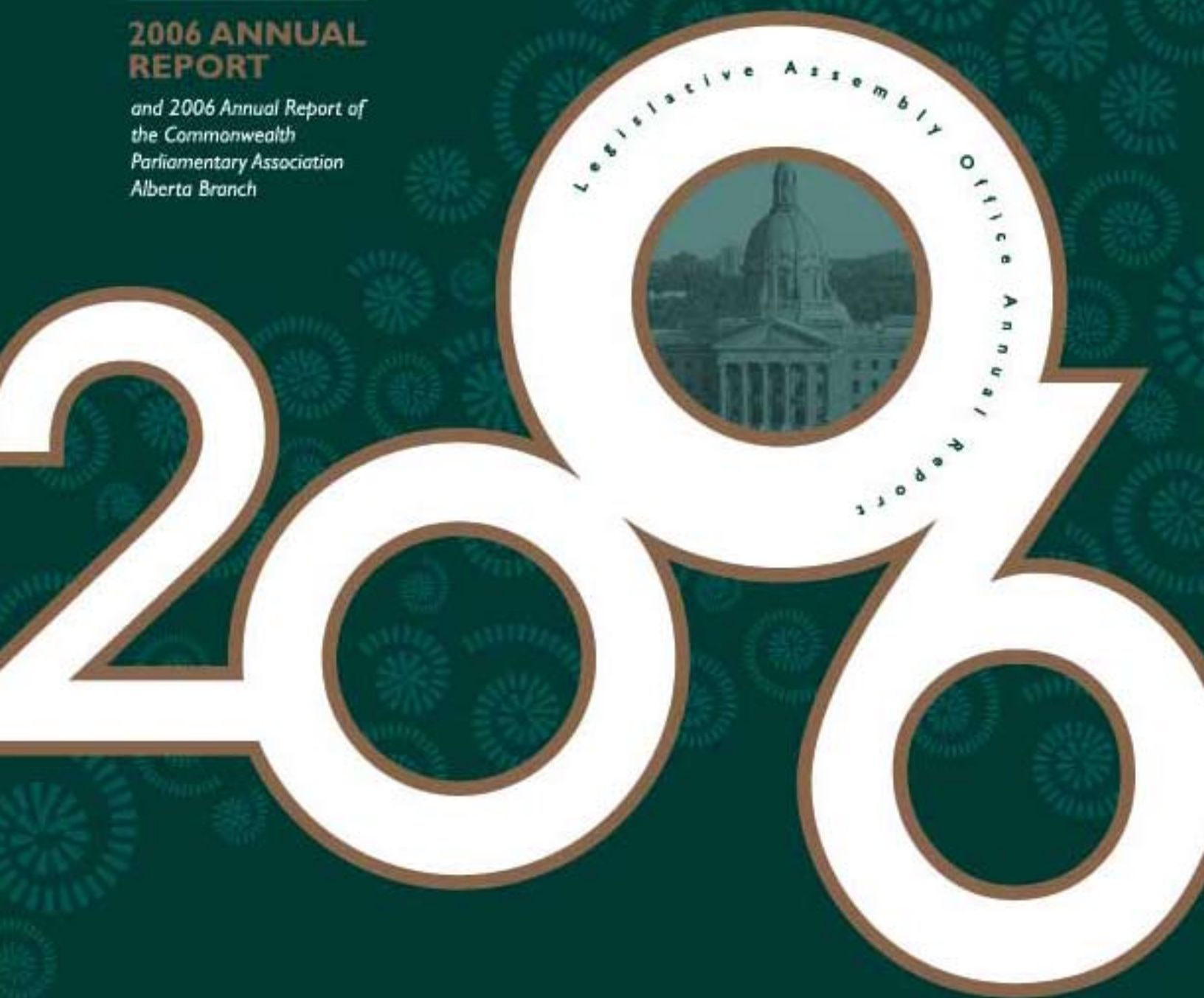

○ AN INTRODUCTION

Legislative Assembly Office: In service to Alberta's parliament



The origins of Alberta's Legislative Assembly Office (LAO) can be traced to 14th century England, when Parliament elected the first Speaker and appointed the first Clerk. Today the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly is the head of the LAO, and the Clerk is the Speaker's deputy. The Legislative Assembly Act of 1983 made the LAO's current name official.

The most common misconception about the LAO is that it is a branch of government and that its staff are government employees. However, in the parliamentary system the government is the executive branch, responsible for applying and enforcing laws; the Legislative Assembly is the legislative branch, responsible for establishing those laws. The Legislative Assembly Office provides various types of support to the entire Assembly – both Members of government and opposition caucuses.

Although the LAO is sometimes called the Speaker's department, it is not a government department. The Speaker does not belong to the cabinet and cannot be asked questions during Oral Question Period or participate in the Assembly's debates. However, the Speaker does have administrative authority and responsibility similar to that of a minister of a government department. The Clerk is the Speaker's chief administrative deputy and has authority and responsibility similar to that of a deputy minister.

The Speaker has two distinct but related roles. In the Assembly the Speaker maintains order and ensures that Members of the Legislative Assembly conduct their business according to the Standing Orders of the Assembly.

Administratively, the Speaker is responsible for the Assembly's records and for ensuring the provision of a range of services to Members and the public. The latter include financial administration, human resource management, technological support, public education programming, purchasing, communications and library, legal and parliamentary services.

The LAO as a whole has the same procedural and administrative roles. This is a unique characteristic and is evident throughout the office, particularly during session, when the normal duties, work hours and office locations of many staff change significantly.

The LAO's annual budget as well as provisions for financial and human resource administration are under the purview of the Special Standing Committee on Members' Services. As an all-party committee of the Assembly the Members' Services Committee regulates constituency office support and Members' pay, allowances, benefits and group insurance plans, all of which the LAO administers. Traditionally, the Speaker chairs the Members' Services Committee.

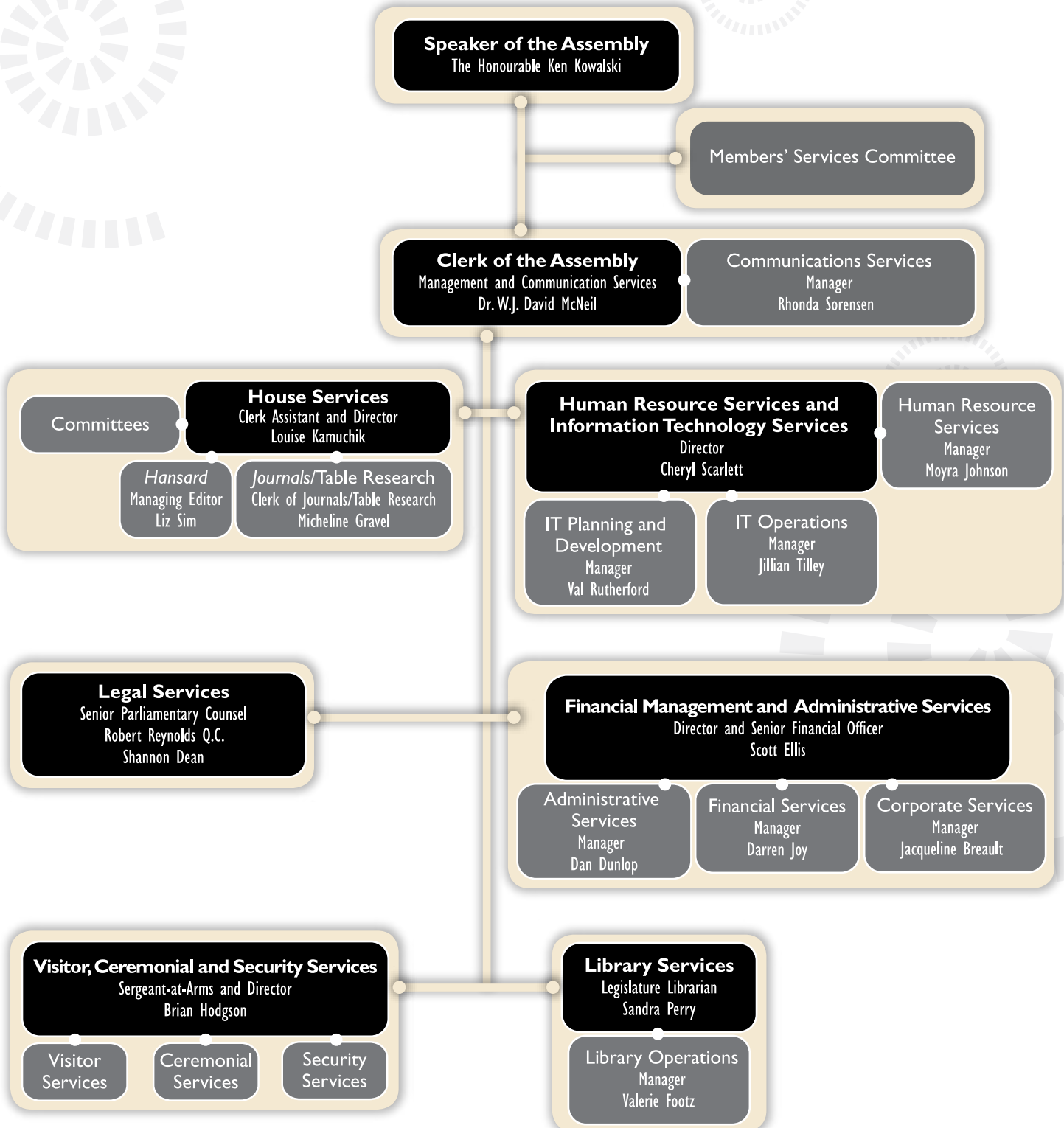
Each party of elected members, or caucus, is a branch of the LAO. Although the Speaker technically has authority over the administration of each caucus office, for obvious reasons these branches operate with considerable autonomy. Therefore, the caucus branches are not part of this report; it includes only branches of the LAO under the Speaker's full control. However, since the caucuses receive financial, administrative, research and human resource services as well as other support from other branches of the LAO, this report does comment on those services. In addition, the office's consolidated budget estimates and audited financial statements, which appear at the end of this report, include caucus finances.

OFFICE OF THE CLERK

Responsible for processing the daily business of the House and providing management and communications support to all branches of the LAO.

The Clerk's Office is also responsible for the operation of the Legislature information line. The Clerk acts as a liaison at the deputy minister level with government departments and assists in co-ordinating Member participation in interparliamentary activities.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES (FMAS)

Provides full accounting services such as budget preparation and monitoring, payment processing and financial reporting as well as administrative services, including equipment and supply procurement, telecommunications management, constituency office leasing and credit card administration. FMAS also handles the responsibilities under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act and Records Management Guidelines for the LAO.

HUMAN RESOURCE SERVICES (HRS)

Advises on employment and policy issues for the Speaker, Members, caucuses, constituencies and the LAO as well as manages the Legislative Assembly human resource and payroll system, including co-ordinating

MLA and staff compensation plans and administering employee and service contracts. In addition, HRS oversees the recruitment and retention policies for nonpartisan positions, ensures safe work practices and promotes health and wellness initiatives.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES (ITS)

ITS is dedicated to providing all technology services to the Speaker, Members, Caucuses and Constituency Offices.

ITS places a major emphasis on supporting the technology interdependencies between clients and ensures that the operation of all services, including network infrastructure, application development, hardware and software, is reliable and operational.

LEGAL SERVICES – PARLIAMENTARY COUNSEL

Provide legal advice on a wide range of matters, including parliamentary procedure, and draft private Members' public bills and private bills. Both Senior Parliamentary Counsel serve as Table Officers in the House and advise the Speaker on points of order and questions of privilege.

LIBRARY SERVICES

Offers information, news and reference and research services to the Members and their staff using current library and information technology. As well, Library Services provides training in the use of services that are delivered electronically to the Members' desktops.

HOUSE SERVICES

Along with providing advice on parliamentary procedure, producing the Votes and Proceedings, Order Paper, *Journals* and assisting in maintaining House records such as bills and motions, House Services provides all arrangements for the Assembly's standing, special standing and select special committee meetings and assists with expenses, budgets, historical records and transcripts relating to committees. In addition, the recording and publishing of print and electronic versions of *Alberta Hansard*, the official report of the proceedings of the Legislative Assembly and its committees, fall under the responsibility of House Services. This includes the administration of a subscription service to *Alberta Hansard*, Votes and Proceedings and bills and distribution of sessional publications. The *Hansard* staff in the House Services Branch also provide proofreading and editing services to other branches.

VISITOR, CEREMONIAL AND SECURITY SERVICES (VCSS)

Plans and executes ceremonial and special events as well as the co-ordination of school and public outreach programs, tours of the facilities and delivery of several educational and orientation materials. Maintaining security in the Chamber and precincts, providing security-related advice to constituency offices and managing the Alberta Legislative Assembly page program are also responsibilities of VCSS.

As part of the Legislative Assembly's 100 Years of Democracy celebrations a series of historical plaques documenting Alberta's heritage from the presettlement era to the present day were developed. They were unveiled at the March 15 dinner and are now housed along Members' Way in the Legislature pedway.

■ KEY RESPONSIBILITY AREA 1:

Provision of timely, professional advice and impartial information to Members

I N F O R M A T I O N

Advice

FMAS provided information and advice regarding changes to Members' Services Committee Orders affecting Members' allowances and entitlements (Members' Services Allowances, temporary residence allowance) in 2006. FMAS also advised Independent Members on budget and expenditures.

In addition, FMAS advised Members and constituency staff regarding the use of Member/constituency websites and conferred with other LAO managers to draft guidelines for Member/constituency website usage. As well, FMAS offered advice on best practices for the organization and disposition of Members' records and assisted with the disposition of Members' records as requested.

Due to the leadership race in 2006 various MLA appointments within the government Members' caucus changed. As a result, HRS conferred with Members on subsequent pay and benefit adjustments as well as matters relating to contract administration of staff impacted by the cabinet shuffles. HRS also supported the transition of a new whip and chief of staff for the government Members' caucus.

Parliamentary Counsel provided support and advice to the Speaker and other presiding officers on parliamentary law and privilege.

In addition, Parliamentary Counsel reviewed amendments, private Members' motions, motions for return, written questions and petitions as well as responded to questions from Members, caucus and constituency staff on a variety of legal and procedural issues. A wide array of contracts/agreements dealing with licensing, leases, employment and fee for service and other service arrangements were also reviewed and/or prepared by Parliamentary Counsel.

Additionally, drafting and procedural expertise were provided by Parliamentary Counsel in the preparation of amendments to the Standing Orders of the Assembly and Members' Services Committee Orders as well as in the preparation of private Members' public bills and private bills. In 2006, 13 public bills and four private bills were introduced.

Parliamentary Counsel also monitored legal actions affecting the Legislative Assembly, defended the interests of the Assembly when required and provided briefings to constituency office and caucus staff on procedural matters and legal issues. Parliamentary Counsel provided legal services to the Chief Electoral Officer as well.

House Services provided procedural advice and guidance to the Speaker and Members and staff as well as provided support to the Table Officers of the Assembly.

The Sergeant-at-Arms or the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms visited 31 constituency offices to offer face-to-face advice on office safety and personal safety. The office of the Sergeant-at-Arms provided further advice and support to constituency offices as needed.

Publications

Hansard continued to meet all publication and delivery targets in 2006 and reported over 310 hours of meetings of the Assembly and its committees, transcribing in excess of 2.5 million words and publishing 2,416 pages of transcript.

In addition to preparing and editing *Hansard*, House Services maintained House records and statistics as well as prepared and edited the 2006 *Journals*, Order Paper and Votes and Proceedings for the Second Session of the 26th Legislature. During session House Services prepared daily scripts for the Speaker as well as scripts for participants in ceremonial functions.

Library Services prepared a series of bibliographies covering topics such as oil sands development, police governance, student health and wellness, child care, alternative energy resources, democratic reform and lobbying and lobbyists. As well, Library Services' Profiles

Service, which provides e-mail updates of newspaper and periodical articles to Members and LAO staff following particular issues, monitored 17 different topics of interest.

Online Information

Communications Services produced a 100 Years of Democracy website linked from the Legislative Assembly site to promote centennial events and initiatives.

Library Services redesigned and redeveloped the online version of Scrapbook *Hansard* in partnership with Communications Services and ITS. Scrapbook *Hansard* Digital Library was launched internally on November 30 at the Constituency Employee Seminar. The digital collection currently consists of 5,049 newspaper articles spanning 20 years.

Library Services provided desktop access to improved search features of the Canadian Research Index and the Canadian Business and Current Affairs databases. Also, Library Services added Library PressDisplay and PAIS International (Public Affairs Information Service) to the online database system and made the electronic edition of the *Canadian Parliamentary Guide* available online.

In addition, the Alberta Electronic Government Documents Archive, developed and maintained by Library Services, expanded to include 2,654 documents, increasing the size of this collection by 28 per cent over the previous year. Access to this archive is available in the library catalogue. The library collection as a whole grew by approximately 3 per cent, including subscriptions to 16 new periodical and newspaper titles.

Library Services also continued to microfilm weekly newspapers and compile New Books in the Library (NBIL), Selected Periodical Articles in the Library

(SPAL), Ministers and Critics and Canadian Legislation alerting services.

As part of the online expansion of the health and safety program Human Resource Services (HRS) created a monthly tipsheet identifying potential hazards and preventative actions and moved to electronic quarterly reporting of statistics.

General Information

Financial Management and Administrative Services (FMAS) conducted orientations for new caucus managers as well as developed and presented caucus expenditure guidelines to the Members' Services Committee. These guidelines were approved at the December 2006 meeting. FMAS also conducted a caucus seminar regarding online personal expense claims and allowable Members' expenses.

Parliamentary Counsel prepared the annual list of required tablings and circulated it to all Members, officers of the Legislature and senior officials throughout government prior to session.

Communications Services continued to produce the bimonthly newsletter *Preview*, which highlights Legislature programs and events, as well as manage the Legislature information line. Staff fielded 2,973 inquiries in 2006.

General Services

in 2005 and used throughout 2006. Implementation of the new identity will begin in 2007.

Additionally, Communications Services continued to provide general communications support to the other branches, including strategic planning as well as the development of writing and design pieces tailored to meet individual branch objectives. Communications Services also provided speech writing and photography services in support of a variety of annual and centennial events.

With the support of Parliamentary Counsel Communications Services prepared contracts and continued to manage the broadcast of House proceedings.

In conjunction with Communications Services HRS developed a new image and style for recruitment advertisements and revised the career section of the LAO website to better market the culture and benefits of working for the LAO.

HRS provided one-on-one commencements for 63 new salaried and 95 wage employees consulted with 37 terminating salaried employees and

retiring employees and processed 110 wage terminations. In addition, HRS co-ordinated leaves of absence for 13 employees and 17 transfers to other public service agencies. HRS also supported 69 summer staff and administered 139 contracts.

As well, nine competitions were held, and 25 employees were recruited. This involved HRS screening over 181 resumes and conducting 96 interviews.

HRS worked with the office of the Sergeant-at-Arms to conduct 31 interviews for the Alberta Legislature page program and worked with House Services in the recruitment of House of Commons pages by conducting interviews with applicants from across Alberta.

The Sergeant-at-Arms provided speech writing services for a number of events including the Eid-ul-Adha ceremony, the unveiling of the White Ensign plaque, the visit of Their Royal Highnesses the Earl and Countess of Wessex, the poppy presentation and the Remembrance Day ceremony.

Hansard continued to provide effective proofreading services to other branches of the LAO as well as co-operated with Communications Services in the

production of special-edition *Hansards* in commemoration of the 100 Years of Democracy celebrations on March 15 and the retirement of Premier Ralph Klein. These unique documents included photos and captions as well as the relevant portions of the transcript.

Hansard also produced close to 600 speech reprints in paper, electronic and audio format for Members.

FMAS initiated an Information and Records Management (IRM) Committee, which includes representation from all branches of the LAO. The committee provides information on IRM practices, acts as an advisory body to the Clerk and assisted with the selection of a contractor to develop a strategic plan for IRM.

In addition, FMAS fully implemented the AMEX corporate credit card as the new MLA travel card and liaised with legislative offices staff to discuss consistent budget and reporting practices as well as other common financial issues.

Committee Support

House Services provided procedural, research and organizational support to the chairs and members of the Assembly's standing and special standing committees as well as for three select special committees. Budget requirements for all committees were prepared for presentation to the Special Standing Committee on Members' Services, and committee expenditures were reconciled on a monthly/yearly basis. House Services was assisted in its role as committee support by Communications Services and Parliamentary Counsel, who provided planning and procedural expertise respectively.

The 11-member all-party Select Special Conflicts of Interest Act Review Committee, established by the Legislative Assembly during the 2005

spring session, completed its mandate with the tabling of its final report at the end of the 2006 spring session.

Also tabled during the spring session of 2006 was the report of the Select Special Chief Electoral Officer Search Committee established during the 2005 fall sitting.

In addition, an 11-member all-party Select Special Personal Information Protection Act Review committee was established during the 2006 spring session with an 18-month mandate ending December 2007.

House Services also continued to be responsible for scheduling the use of Legislative Assembly committee rooms and liaising with the committee room facilitator.

Online Services

Based on the information technology strategic plan ITS continued to move forward with several initiatives intended to further enhance services for Members and staff and anticipate future needs. Some projects in or near deployment include secure wireless access as well as data and business process consolidation.

In addition, ITS continued to collaborate with Communications Services on the redevelopment of the LAO's intranet and Internet sites. Based on the results of the previous year's extensive audit and the records management needs of the LAO online, the core committee recommended an extensive rebuild of the internal system with SharePoint portal technology. The rebuild of both Our House and the Assembly sites is expected to be completed by 2008. Communications Services and ITS continue to manage online content.

ITS also assisted House Services with simplifying online access to House

records from previous legislatures by streamlining the document search process.

In an effort to streamline operations and facilitate administrative processing for MLAs and staff, ITS worked with FMAS to deliver phase 1 of onTAP (Online Transaction and Approval Processing). This web application collects expense claim data, checks for accuracy and summarizes it appropriately for financial reporting.

FMAS fully implemented a system for electronic, web-based ordering of overprinted materials by Members and staff.

Additionally, with the intention of extending the range and ease of use of web documents, House Services developed and implemented a branch project to convert WordPerfect *Hansard* issue documents into a portable document format (PDF) used universally on the web, scanned all issues of *Hansard* from 1972 through 1990 inclusive and began converting the scans to fully searchable PDF documents through an optical character recognition program. Five years of WordPerfect documents and one year of paper documents have been converted to PDF format for posting on the web.

The most popular and frequently accessed of the Library's web services in 2006 were Alberta Daily News, Reference Shelf and Electronic Resources. The online Library catalogue was enhanced to provide access to available reviews, summaries, tables of contents and book covers. The Library section of the LAO website was also updated to provide more direct access to searchable databases.

Equipment

An exciting initiative by ITS in 2006 was the introduction of Live Meeting. This web application provides a facility to host remote training, meetings and online presentations over the Internet. This tool will facilitate efficient communication with

and support of constituency offices from across the province. A new desktop tool, Microsoft Office Communicator, was rolled out in the fall as part of a real-time communication package. ITS has focused considerable efforts on tools to provide MLAs and staff with anytime, anywhere communications.

ITS also continued the upgrade and maintenance of hardware, software and infrastructure for desktops, laptops, servers, switches and cable runs. Software upgrades included a firewall, finance/payroll systems and database servers. As always, considerable time was spent on securing the LAO network.

VCSS collaborated with ITS on the rebuild of the Legislative Assembly Reservation System (LARS) application to better serve MLAs and the public in booking tours and Chamber seating. This application has streamlined the process and provides enhanced tracking and statistical capabilities.

Supplies

FMAS maintained constituency office furniture subsequent to the upgrade project as well as planned and implemented the second phase of the Members' Legislature office furniture upgrade project.

FMAS managed the set-up and reconfiguration of telecommunications services and the provision or moving of Members' furniture.

Additionally, new overprinted stationery was procured by FMAS, which also updated Member's telephone directory listings through liaison with Service Alberta.

As well, FMAS assisted Independent Members with setting up their offices by providing procurement advice and services for telecommunications set-up, online supplies ordering and other administrative assistance. The upgrading

of caucus office furnishings was completed by FMAS in 2006.

Subsequent to the December 2006 cabinet shuffle, FMAS also assisted private government Member offices with budget adjustments, the updating of expenditure officer designations and caucus expenditure guidelines.

FACILITIES

100 Years of Democracy Initiatives

In celebration of 100 Years of Democracy in Alberta a series of historical plaques documenting Alberta's heritage from the presettlement era through to the present day were produced by Communications Services. The entire collection was unveiled as part of the March 15 celebrations and now adorns the south Legislature pedway, renamed Members' Way.

VCSS partnered with Alberta Infrastructure to commission the design, construction and delivery of 36 leather replica Westminster chairs.

In addition, a stained glass window was commissioned by Library Services in commemoration of 100 Years of Democracy in Alberta and 100 years of service by the Legislature Library. The window was unveiled by the Speaker at a ceremony held in conjunction with the Winter Constituency Staff Administration Seminar.

Communications Services assisted VCSS with the production of ceiling and door graphics for the mock Legislature theatres in the Legislature pedway. Communications Services also assisted with the development of new displays for the School-at-the-Legislature program and the general Legislature programs as well as a display detailing the history of the mace.

VCSS co-ordinated exhibits in the pedway featuring 100 Years of Democracy and Alberta's Speakers as well as displayed the travelling exhibit Behind These Doors, which showcased parliaments across Canada, and a LEGO model of the Misericordia hospital by the Northern Alberta LEGO Users Group.

Painting of mallard ducks, grain elevators and lodgepole pine trees created as insets in the exposed aggregate walls of the north/south pedway was commissioned by VCSS, which also assisted with site preparations for functions hosted in the Interpretive Centre and ensured that the Legislative Assembly Gift Shop continued to provide efficient service to Members and staff.

Security/Safety and Maintenance

The Director of VCSS continued to chair the Legislature Business Resumption Planning Committee as well as the LAO Pandemic Planning Committee, which include representation from various other branches within the LAO.

The Director of VCSS continued to serve on the Security Co-ordination Committee to discuss and co-ordinate security issues related to the Legislature Building and surrounding areas. This committee is comprised of security stakeholders drawn from the LAO, the office of the Solicitor General and Alberta Infrastructure. As well, the office of the Sergeant-At-Arms continued to co-ordinate the maintenance of alarm systems in constituency offices and provide security for Members and for spectators that were seated in the galleries during the 2006 session.

Emergency preparedness continued to be a hot topic for the LAO health and safety program, and new evacuation guidelines, brochures and training sessions were developed for and delivered to the School-at-the-Legislature classroom

and visiting school groups as well as the Visitor Services Interpretive Centre.

HRS continued working with building partners to hold evacuation drills in the Annex and the Legislature Building.

As part of HRS's health and safety program first aid kits were delivered to each constituency office, and vehicle first aid kits were distributed to each Member for use while travelling. As well, two immunization clinics provided flu shots for 176 employees in the Legislature area, and the employee assistance and recovery program supported nine employees on extended absences from work and co-ordinated successful return-to-work programs when employees were off work for significant time periods.

■ KEY RESPONSIBILITY AREA 3:

Provision of an effective workplace to support Members

Training/Professional Development

HRS consulted with managers and staff on training options and co-ordinated professional development training for 36 staff as well as provided in-house training sessions, including coaching styles for today's workplace for LAO managers, team building for ITS staff and a session for constituency staff that focused on managing stress and change. First aid training was provided for 51 staff.

Eleven ergonomic representatives were trained by HRS to identify and correct workstation alignments. The LAO's ergonomic program, which focuses on education and awareness in order to prevent injury, provided ergonomic orientations to 30 new employees, refreshers to 19 employees and detailed workstation analyses for eight employees. No injuries were reported.

All Legislative Assembly Security Services (LASS) and Visitor Services staff were trained in first aid, CPR and AED (automated external defibrillation). In addition, LASS staff were trained in basic defensive tactics.

VCSS attended a familiarization tour of two Edmonton tourist sites and professional development sessions, including an all-day VCSS/LAO strategic goals retreat.

The Sergeant-at-Arms/Director of VCSS, LASS, Legislature pages and eight full-time staff attended at least one professional development course in 2006. As well, all Legislature pages were involved in a professional development program and a speech competition.

Library Services participated in a number of training programs and information sessions on topics such as records management, digital archives and online searching.

Organizational Changes

The constituency compensation system was implemented April 1, 2006, allowing for an equitable three-tier compensation system, both salary and benefits, for constituency staff while still giving Members the flexibility to address individual employee needs. HRS processed 110 amendments on existing salary and wage contracts in support of this initiative. Employees were also provided with the opportunity to apply to purchase prior service toward the public service pension plan. HRS compiled detailed pay histories and co-ordinated the documentation process for over 63 applications for the purchase of this prior pension service.

A caucus compensation system for the government Members' caucus was developed by HRS to allow for equitable merit and market increases for caucus staff. Introduced July 1, 2006, the

new system involved the development of updated job profiles, pay grids and performance management tools.

HRS also piloted a revised performance management system in three branches, with emphasis on employee achievements and commitment to formal learning plans. With the success of the pilot program the new system will roll out to remaining LAO branches in 2007. A similar system was developed and implemented for managers in May 2006.

■ KEY RESPONSIBILITY AREA 4:

Provision of support to maintain and develop the parliamentary system in Alberta

100 Years of Democracy Celebrations

The past year was both busy and exciting as March 15 marked the 100th anniversary of the first sitting of Alberta's first Legislative Assembly and began a year of celebration. To mark the occasion, a number of events were planned and initiatives undertaken. The landmark brought to a close years of planning and preparation for many staff as several projects were unveiled as part of the celebrations.

Various branches of the LAO worked together to plan and execute a number of centennial events. These and other events are detailed in the events section of this annual report.

Communications Services spearheaded a number of initiatives throughout the year-long celebrations. In addition to creating a visual identity and promotional items specific to the celebrations, Communications Services co-ordinated a province-wide advertising campaign, produced specialty item print materials and managed the release of information.

A few projects that stand out for Communications Services are the service medallions honouring current and former Members of Alberta's Legislative Assembly and the *100 Years at the Legislative Assembly of Alberta: A Centennial Celebration* coffee-table book, which was distributed to all Members and staff as a keepsake.

Also in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Assembly the Speaker delivered historical vignettes on each sitting day. Research for the vignettes was compiled by Library Services.

Public Education

The Virtual Visit: Step Inside the Alberta Legislature online tour was publicly launched. This groundbreaking interactive tool was developed through partnerships with LearnAlberta and Alberta Education. Various branches of the LAO, including VCSS, Library Services, Communications Services and ITS, collaborated to make this project a success. Communications Services produced all promotional materials and worked with Alberta Education to plan the public launch event, held May 10.

As part of the centennial celebrations Communications Services co-ordinated the What Democracy Means to Me essay contest for Alberta students and seniors. The winners of the contest read their submissions at the public launch of the Virtual Visit.

The School-at-the-Legislature (SATL) program, co-ordinated by VCSS, had 32 classes with a total of 842 students in attendance for 2006. HRS piloted a new presentation to SATL participants, using a career path concept and a visual learning style that allows students to more easily understand and relate to the role of HRS in a parliamentary environment.

Some 71 grade 10 students from throughout the province took part in Mr. Speaker's MLA for a Day program on April

24 and 25. Participants viewed Oral Question Period and met with Members to discuss the roles of the cabinet, the Official Opposition and the private member. Representatives from the media also shared their experiences and spoke on the role of the press in the parliamentary system. Table Officers facilitated a debate on a motion urging the government to adopt a policy to reduce the voting age in provincial and municipal elections from 18 to 16 years of age. Participant accommodations were provided by the Alberta-Northwest Territories Command of the Royal Canadian Legion. This program is co-ordinated by House Services and VCSS.

In addition, every year VCSS co-ordinates and supports several youth parliament organizations holding events at the Legislature.

Hansard partnered with ITS in revamping the *Hansard* display in the Legislature Interpretive Centre. The interactive display now allows visitors to answer an online quiz on *Alberta Hansard*, view a flowchart on production method, and type a sample transcription that calculates typing speed and accuracy.

Parliamentary Counsel participated in teaching courses at postsecondary educational institutions on parliamentary law and parliamentary procedure as well as fulfilled requests for speaking engagements with the Canadian Study of Parliament Group and the University of Alberta.

Library Services provided a series of orientation sessions to students of Grant MacEwan College's Library and Information Studies program and to members of the NEOS Library Consortium. NEOS is a central Alberta consortium of government, health, college and university libraries.

Associations

Alberta's Table Officers continued involvement in the Association of Clerks-at-the-Table in Canada through participation in the annual professional development seminar held in the Yukon Territory in 2006.

The Clerk Assistant/Director of House Services continued to act as administrative secretary to the Alberta branch of the Assemblée parlementaire de la Francophonie (APF) and provided Member support at the annual regional conference of the APF.

In addition, House Services provided support to Alberta MLAs attending the Joint Conference of Legislative Auditors, the Canadian Council of Public Accounts Committees Conference and the Council on Governmental Ethics Laws Conference.

Hansard assisted in planning the business agenda of the annual conference of the *Hansard* Association of Canada, and at the conference a staff member delivered a presentation on training methods.

The Sergeant-at-Arms continued in a key leadership role hosting the 2006 Canadian Association of Sergeants-at-Arms Conference.

In association with Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) in the Philippines, Parliamentary Counsel served as the Canadian Legislative Advisor for the Legislative Capacity Enhancement Program for the Regional Legislative Assembly of the Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) in the Philippines. This involved providing

expertise to the Members and staff of the ARMM Legislative Assembly as part of the Philippines-Canada Local Government Support Program, a CIDA-funded initiative. Also Parliamentary Counsel continued participation with the Canadian Bar Association and the Association of Parliamentary Counsel in Canada as well as participated in the Association of Clerks-at-the-Table. Additionally, Parliamentary Counsel presented to parliamentary associations, including the Association of Parliamentary Counsel in Canada and the Association of Sergeants-at-Arms.

The Director of Visitor, Ceremonial and Security Services and the head of Visitor Services attended the 2006 Canadian Capital Cities Organization (CCCO) Conference and the 2006 Parliamentary Visitor Services Association Conference. As well, VCSS staff attended the Travel Alberta Conference and the Alberta Teachers' Association Social Studies Conference. VCSS is also involved with the Edmonton branch of the Royal Commonwealth Society of Canada and assisted with the Commonwealth essay contest. The Sergeant-at-Arms provided input and advice to Westminster regarding the creation of a new African Sergeants-at-Arms association.

Managers representing HRS, ITS and FMAS attended the annual Canadian Association of Parliamentary Administrators Conference hosted

by Ontario. The Director of FMAS was elected to the executive committee, and ITS representatives from Alberta facilitated a discussion on BlackBerry/PDA devices and their impact on daily operations.

FMAS provided information on Alberta's financial practices for the commission reviewing the financial environment of the Legislature of Newfoundland and Labrador and represented the Alberta Legislative Assembly Office at meetings, seminars and the annual conference of the Association for Information and Records Management (ARMA) International (Edmonton chapter and Canadian region) as well as at public sector records management gatherings.

Library Services attended conferences of the following organizations and associations: Alberta Association of Library Technicians (AALT), Alberta Library Conference, the Canadian Library Association (CLA), the Canadian Association of Law Libraries (CALL), Netspeed and the Association of Parliamentary Librarians in Canada (APLIC) Biennial Conference in Iqaluit, Nunavut.

Communications Services continued membership with the International Association of Business Communicators (IABC) and attended various professional development sessions and networking events. As well, the manager

of Communications Services accepted a position on the board of directors for IABC Edmonton.

Publications

Library Services completed the research, writing and editing of three historical/biographical works, and the Office of the Clerk in conjunction with the Office of the Chief Electoral Officer produced the final part of the four-volume centennial series commemorating 100 Years of Democracy in Alberta. Communications Services assisted with the design, layout and production of the set. By year-end all volumes were at the printer in preparation for launch in early 2007.

Together House Services and Parliamentary Counsel continued participation as the Alberta correspondents for the *Table Review*, a parliamentary publication. Parliamentary Counsel also responded to requests for information by members of the legal profession, colleagues from across Canada and the Commonwealth, students and members of the public.

Community Outreach

The LAO once again organized events and initiatives in support of the United Way. In 2006 the committee designed a wall calendar featuring breathtaking photos of the Legislature Building.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2006

NOTE 1

AUTHORITY

The Legislative Assembly Office (the "Office") is operated under the authority of the *Legislative Assembly Act*. Annual operating budgets are approved by the Special Standing Committee on Members' Services.

NOTE 2

PURPOSE

Within the traditions of parliamentary democracy as constitutionally established in Alberta, the Legislative Assembly Office will:

1. Assist the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly in fulfilling the duties of office.
2. Assist Members in carrying out their roles as legislators within the parliamentary system and as representatives of their constituencies.
3. Meet and exceed the service expectations of the Members.
4. Respond to increased demands for technology-related services from Members, staff and the public.
5. Provide Members with professional development opportunities and foster inter-parliamentary co-operation through participation in national and international parliamentary forums and exchange programs.
6. Increase public awareness of the Legislative Assembly within Alberta's democratic parliamentary system through information and outreach programs.

7. Continue to foster understanding of the division of powers among the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government.
8. Ensure that the Legislative Assembly Office (LAO) provides quality services in an increasingly competitive environment.
9. Ensure the continued development of the effectiveness and efficiency of the LAO workforce through the fostering and recognition of leadership and teamwork.
10. Develop and carry out plans for special centennial events and projects.

NOTE 3

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND REPORTING PRACTICES

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles:

a) Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is the Legislative Assembly Office, for which the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly is responsible.

The Office operates within the General Revenue Fund (the "Fund"). The Fund is administrated by the Minister of Finance. All receipts of the Office are deposited into the Fund, and all disbursements made by the Office are paid from the Fund. The net transfer from the General Revenues is the difference between all cash receipts and all cash disbursements made.

b) Basis of Financial Reporting

Revenues

All revenues are reported on the accrual basis of accounting.

Expenses

Expenses represent the costs of resources consumed during the year on the Office's operations.

Valuation Adjustments

Valuation adjustments include changes in the valuation allowances used to reflect assets at their net recoverable or other appropriate value. Valuation adjustments also represent the change in management's estimate of future payments arising from obligations relating to vacation pay and transition allowance. Furthermore, accommodation costs, provided by Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation at no cost, are included in valuation adjustments so as to show the entire cost of the operation of the Office.

Assets

Current assets of the Office consist of cash, advances to and accounts receivable from other organizations, employers and other individuals, and inventory held for resale.

The fair values of cash and accounts receivable and advances are estimated to approximate their book values.

Inventory held for resale is reported at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Capital assets of the Office are recorded at cost and amortized on a straight-line basis, over the estimated useful lives of the assets, invoiced at \$2,500 or greater, as follows:

The Office follows government budgetary practices that allow funds from an operating budget to be used to purchase capital assets. These purchases are included in expenses on the statement of operations but are then removed from expenses through a valuation adjustment and are capitalized and amortized over their useful lives.

Liabilities

Liabilities include all financial claims payable by the Office at fiscal year-end.

The Members' transition allowance is estimated based on Members' years of service and their most recent remuneration amounts. The annual charge is the amount that is estimated to have been earned by Members during the year.

The fair values of accounts payable and accrued liabilities, vacation pay, and Members' transition allowance are estimated to approximate their book values.

Net Assets

Net assets represent the difference between the value of assets held by the Office and its liabilities.

c) Correction of a Prior Period Error

The Office's bank accounts were established when the Office moved to their own independent financial systems (separate from the government financial system operated by the Ministry of Finance). The Office and the Provincial Treasurer agreed to include the accounts in

the Province's cash management system with any interest earned on the funds payable to the Ministry of Finance's General Revenue Fund (GRF) and that the accounts be subject to the normal cash management controls. At the time that the accounts were established, and subsequently, the Office was advised that these funds were reported in the Consolidated Financial Statements of the Province as prepared by the Ministry of Finance.

Effective March 31, 2006, and following inquiries by the Office, the Ministry of Finance advised the Office that funds in the Office's bank accounts should be reported in the Office's financial statements. In prior years this was not done.

The correction of this prior period error has resulted in the financial statements being retroactively restated to include the cash balances in the Office's financial statements. The impact of the restatement is:

There has been no impact on the Statement of Operations because all interest revenue earned on the funds is directed to the Ministry of Finance's General Revenue Fund as agreed by the Office and the Provincial Treasurer when the bank accounts were established. The net transfer from GRF is impacted because in prior years the GRF was increased or decreased by the changes in the Office's cash balance and reported on a net basis.

NOTE 5

CONTRIBUTION FROM ALBERTA INFRASTRUCTURE AND TRANSPORTATION

Included in the \$875,312 (2005 - \$882,982) contribution from Alberta Infrastructure and Transportation is \$100,000 for upgrades to Legislative Assembly Office furniture in the Legislature Building; \$52,338 for renovations to MLA office space on the 4th floor, Legislature Annex; \$15,000 for renovations to MLA offices on the 6th and 7th floors, Legislature Annex; \$16,049 for furniture refurbishment of the mock Legislature facility in the Legislative Assembly Interpretive Centre; and \$2,350 for design costs for upgrades to the Legislature Chamber sound system.

NOTE 6

MEMBERS' TRANSITION ALLOWANCE

The Office implemented a Members' transition allowance on October 1, 1998. The provisions of the allowance were established in accordance with the Members' Allowances Order (RMSC 1992, c. M-1, as amended, section 9).

A transition allowance is paid to every Member at the time of dissolution of the Legislature unless they are re-elected in the next election. Members who resign their seats are also eligible for the allowance.

Under section 9 the amount paid for service commencing on or after March 20, 1989, is determined by multiplying three months' salary, based on the average monthly salary for the three calendar

years in which the person received their highest salary, by the number of years the person served as a Member on or after March 20, 1989. "Salary" is defined in section 9(1). For service periods prior to March 20, 1989, the allowance is calculated by multiplying the highest rate of a Member's monthly indemnity and expense allowances for one month for every year of service prior to March 20, 1989, with no restrictions. There is no credit for years of service for which the Member has previously received a payment under section 9 or the predecessor section. Eligible recipients may elect to be paid the allowance over a period of up to four years.

In the event of death of an active Member, a transition allowance equivalent to the amount owed at passing is paid to the Member's estate.

NOTE 7

DEFINED BENEFIT PLANS

The Office participates in the following multi-employer pension plans: Management Employees Pension Plan and Public Service Pension Plan. The Office also participates in the multi-employer Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers. The expense for these pension plans is equivalent to the annual contributions of \$725,309 for the year ended March 31, 2006 (2005 - \$568,759).

At December 31, 2005, the Management Employees Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$165,895,000 (2004 - \$268,101,000), and the Public Service Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$187,704,000 (2004 - \$450,068,000). At December 31, 2005, the Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers had a surplus of \$10,018,000 (2004 - \$9,404,000).

The Office also participates in a multi-employer Long-term Disability Income Continuance Plan. At March 31, 2006, the Management, Opted Out and Excluded Plan reported an actuarial surplus of \$8,309,000 (2005 - \$3,208,000). The expense for this plan is limited to employer's annual contributions for the year.

NOTE 9

TRANSFER FROM ALBERTA GAMING LOTTERY FUND

The 2005-2006 estimates reflected a transfer of \$415,000 from Alberta Gaming Lottery Fund as funding to be used by Members of the Legislative Assembly at the community level to assist in Centennial celebrations. The \$415,000 is included in the MLA administration budget as a voted expense, and expenses applied against this funding are recorded under the MLA administration actuals.

100 YEARS OF DEMOCRACY

OVERVIEW

The Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) is an association of members of Commonwealth parliaments who, irrespective of race, religion or culture, are united by community of interest, respect for the rule of law and individual rights and freedoms, and by pursuit of the positive ideals of democracy. Canada was one of the six original member countries of the CPA when it was formed in 1911 under the name of the Empire Parliamentary Association. Each provincial and territorial Legislative Assembly in Canada as well as the federal Parliament comprises a branch of the CPA. All Members of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta are members of the Alberta branch of the CPA. "The Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) Canadian Regional Conference is an exceptional forum for exchanging information and exploring new ideas. The diversity that we [parliamentarians] bring to these meetings is truly one of the important factors in the success we enjoy as federal, provincial and territorial legislators." Those are the words of the Hon. Noël A. Kinsella, Speaker of the Senate of Canada, delivered in his opening address at the 44th Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) Canadian Regional Conference.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Speaker Ken Kowalski, President of the Alberta Branch of the CPA

I have long been a proponent of parliamentary relations, and this statement eloquently expresses views that I wholeheartedly share. I truly believe in lifelong learning, and in my experience CPA conferences have proven to be extremely informative and educational. I also know that being an active member of the CPA has indeed made me a better legislator. I can say without any equivocation that the shared experience and variety of perspectives gained at CPA conferences has helped me to find creative solutions to a variety of challenges.

The sessions at the conference were both dynamic and relevant, dealing with issues such as government accountability, the Canadian mission in Afghanistan and challenges of women in Canadian politics. A highlight of the event was Alberta's own George Rogers chairing the discussion on electoral reform. This topic proved to be one of the most prevalent topics of 2006, discussed at the Canadian regional seminar as well.

Electoral reform has always been an issue of interest throughout Canadian Legislatures, and Alberta is no exception. The success of any democratic system of government hinges on public participation. As voter turnout at election time continues to decline, proper representation can come into question. The exploration of creative ways to reform the system and improve public perception will always be at the forefront.

At the 28th Canadian regional seminar, held in Victoria, British Columbia, I felt privileged to present on the topic *Sharing the Wealth: The Function of Budget Surpluses*. With Alberta's economy hitting a high note thanks to oil and gas revenues during a relative downturn for the rest of the Canadian economy, issues dealing with devolution of control over Alberta's natural resources have been reawakened. It was good to share with my fellow parliamentarians the Alberta perspective. Alberta's prosperity does lend strength to our entire nation.

The 52nd CPA conference, held in Abuja, Nigeria, was attended by the Chair of Committees and Member

for Calgary-McCall, Mr. Shiraz Shariff. The theme was: *Enhancing Standards of Democratic Governance and Public Perceptions of Parliament in the Commonwealth*.

As legislators we are always evolving processes to better serve our constituents. Through membership in international organizations such as the CPA, we are able to obtain a variety of perspectives. One other organization that I recently became more acquainted with is considered a global leader in parliamentary developments, but its foundations lie within our Canadian borders. The Canadian Parliamentary Centre has been lending support to parliamentarians since 1968 as a not-for-profit, nonpartisan organization devoted to improving the effectiveness of representative assemblies around the world. In 2006 I was honoured to be asked to serve a term as a member of the centre's board of directors.

By engaging in learning opportunities and exploring creative solutions on a global level, parliamentarians throughout the world are working together to solve local challenges.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

W.J. David McNeil, Secretary of the Alberta Branch of the CPA and Clerk of the Legislative Assembly

In 2006 my office co-ordinated Member attendance at 15 parliamentary conferences. The learning opportunities afforded Members at these national and international events are abundant.

At the Canadian Regional Presiding Officers' Conference held in Yellowknife from January 19 to 22, I was privileged to be a guest presenter. I drew upon Alberta's experience with the contested election results for the constituency of Edmonton-Castle Downs in the 2004 provincial general election to illustrate the complexities of determining a valid vote count.

Throughout the year the Legislative Assembly was privileged to not only attend various conferences but also to

host visiting delegates as well. Being host to interparliamentary events enables our Legislative Assembly to highlight our province as well as its industry and economy and focus on issues of specific interest to visiting legislators.

From October 15 to 20 the Legislative Assembly of Alberta hosted a seven-member German delegation as part of the Partnership of Parliaments. During their visit the delegation met with the Edmonton public school board and the Faculty of Education at the University of Alberta as well as toured the Stollery children's hospital.

Meetings with the Minister of Education, the Minister of Health and Wellness and various other Members of the Legislative Assembly, including dinner with the Hon. Ken Kowalski, Speaker of the Assembly were also part of the five-day schedule, which wrapped up with a brief tour of our beautiful province.

Since 1993 Canada has been a member of the Partnership of Parliaments, an organization dedicated to fostering transcontinental relationships among parliamentarians.

Another highlight of 2006 was the 24th Conference of the Canadian Association of Sergeants-at-Arms. This event was held from August 8 to 13 in Edmonton and Jasper.

Business sessions included discussions on the powers and issues of privilege and the Sergeant-at-Arms, information and privacy issues as they relate in the parliamentary domain, trends in terrorism, business continuity planning and engaging youth in the democratic process. The latter topic highlighted the educational and outreach programs offered through our Legislature and specifically focused on the Virtual Visit to the Alberta Legislature, an interactive, online tour developed in partnership with Alberta Education.

The conference was attended by 22 delegates from Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand and Tasmania.

It was especially exciting to invite parliamentarians from across Canada to share in our celebrations while the Legislative Assembly of Alberta commemorates 100 years of democracy.

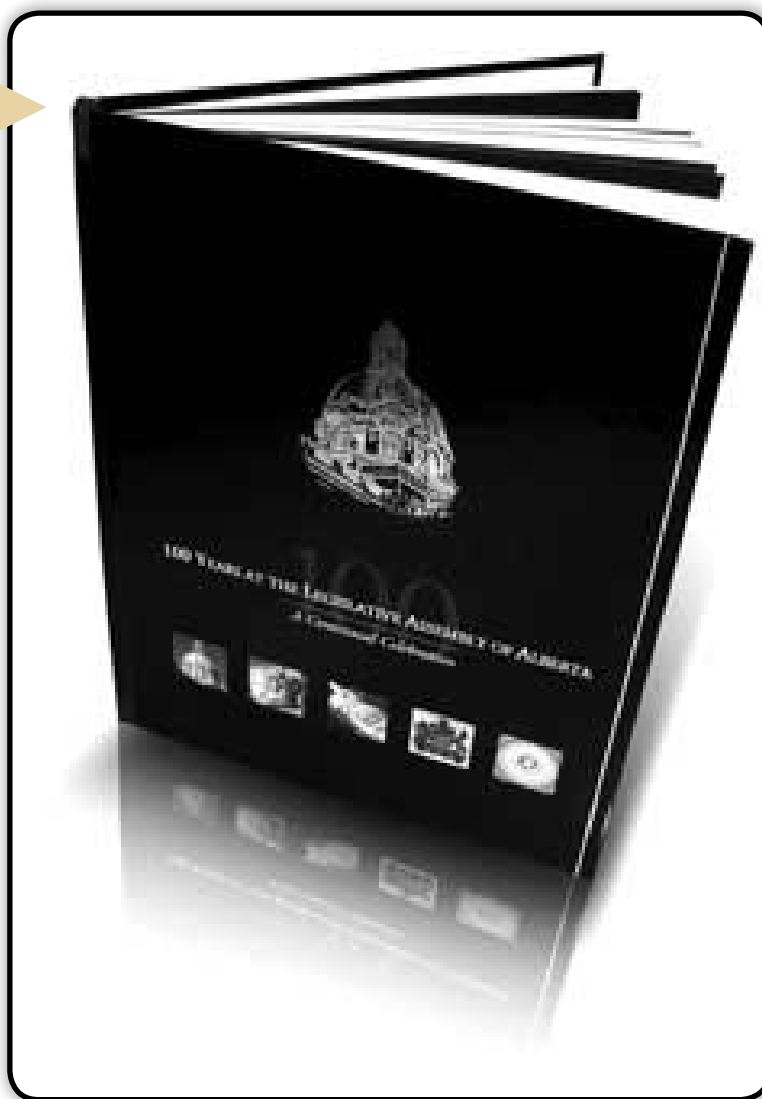

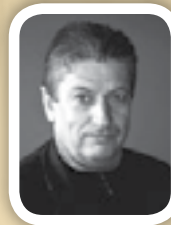

The conference was hosted by N.W.T. Speaker Hon. Paul Delorey, who did an outstanding job and made us all welcome in the beautiful Legislature Building of the N.W.T.

On the first day of the conference delegates had the option of touring the Diavik diamond mine, which was very educational despite the -44° wind chill. We were advised that Canada will soon become the world's second largest producer of diamonds. An open reception hosted by Hon. Paul Delorey,

Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of the N.W.T., was held later that day.

January 20: the session opened with an orientation to consensus government in the N.W.T. and was chaired by Hon. Bev Harrison, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick.

The next session, presented by Gary O'Brien, Deputy Clerk, Senate of Canada, was providing a parliamentary discussion of the work of the United Nations and the declaration of the world conference of Speakers.

This was followed by a presentation by David McNeil, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta, dealing with contested elections. Alberta's experience in the constituency of Edmonton-Castle Downs was used as an example of how complex counting of votes can become.

The final session of the day, presented by Craig James, Clerk of Committees and Clerk Assistant in British Columbia, dealt with managing parliament with civility. As all delegates seemed eager to participate by sharing examples of situations they encountered, this particular session was a great learning experience.

January 21: presentation by Diane Leblanc, Deputy Speaker of Quebec, on the Jean-Charles-Bonenfant Foundation, which is dedicated to education of students on the parliamentary process in Quebec. This was followed by "Challenging the Chair," presented by Tim Mercer, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of N.W.T. This was another session of sharing experiences from across Canada of various situations when the chair's rulings are challenged and the process in dealing with these challenges.

I found the conference to be a tremendous learning experience in my first year as a presiding officer and was able to meet and share experiences with so many of my counterparts throughout the nation.

Report by Shiraz Shariff

1. An Introduction to Consensus Government. Presentation by Tim Mercer, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories. Consensus government is a mixture of Westminster-style parliamentary democracy and traditional aboriginal decision-making style. It is a system that has no political parties, and the government vision is developed by all members of the caucus.

2. Providing a Parliamentary Dimension to the Work of the United Nations: the Declaration of the World Conference of Speakers. Presented by Gary O'Brien, Deputy Clerk, Senate of Canada. The presentation focused on the September 2005 Summit of Heads of State at the United Nations General Assembly's discussion on the influence of parliamentary diplomacy and interparliamentary co-operation; how parliaments can be of assistance in making United Nations reform effective; what new partnerships should there be between parliaments and the United Nations. The presentation also touched on the potential impact on the role of the Canadian Parliament in the conduct of foreign policy.

3. Judicial Recount: "Does 'X' really mark the spot?"

Dr. McNeil's presentation dealt with the judicial recount in the Edmonton-Castle

Downs riding in the November 22, 2004, election. Of importance was the impact of recount on when someone becomes a Member who should be sworn in, who should be invited to participate in a Member's orientation, who is entitled to operate constituency offices, how the budget of a caucus is affected and what entitlements accrue to the successful candidate in the interim period.

4. Managing with the New Civility in B.C.'s Legislative Assembly.

Presented by Craig James, Clerk Assistant of the Legislative Assembly in B.C. The B.C. government undertook "civility" reforms that impact electoral systems and the role of elected officials and parties to improve citizens' engagement.

5. Presentation by Diane Leblanc, Deputy Speaker of the National Assembly of Quebec. The Jean-Charles-Bonenfant Foundation was created to increase citizens' knowledge of political and parliamentary institutions and promote democracy.

6. Challenging the Chair: presented by Tim Mercer, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly of N.W.T. The presentation dealt with the avenues of appeal and challenges open to Members when they felt the chair had erred in interpreting rules or rendered decisions based on partisan or personal interests.

1. Public Communications Plan

The National Assembly of Quebec recognized a need to try to make the people of Quebec more informed about their provincial government. The Speaker went to schools all over the province to encourage young people to become more involved in democracy.

2. Sharing the Wealth

Speaker Kowalski gave a background regarding the formation of Alberta as a province and some facts regarding the devolution of control of natural resources to Alberta and Saskatchewan some 26 years later. He then spoke of the federal concept of “share the wealth” in 1981 with

the national energy program (NEP). The Speaker then outlined five sources of energy revenue. He also spoke to the present financial picture between Alberta and the federal government, where much more is sent to Ottawa than returns in federal benefits and services. A point was made that it is important to hope that Canadian Confederation will recognize and tolerate that a successful Alberta is good for Canada.

3. Electoral Reform Presenter from British Columbia.

Legislatures are struggling to try to find ways to improve voters' options and engage them and help them understand the conduct of government. Effective representation is the goal, but permitting wide deviations from the norm or exceeding the limits of the deviation certainly erodes the principles of effective and equal representation. The idea of fixed dates for elections was discussed. Electoral systems reform was discussed, with the comment that most jurisdictions are considering electoral system change that would be more proportional. The final comment was that governments have to engage the public and bring them into the passion of politics and the importance of open debate about issues and values.

4. The Government as Foster Parents

The presenter outlined that there are approximately 9,200 children in care in British Columbia, with over half of these either Métis or aboriginal children. The presenter admitted that the experience of these children is not very good as most of these children rely on social assistance when they become adults.

One of the areas suggested for improvement is from the federal side. Not enough money is provided to address prevention services or kinship-based care.

Dr. Raj Pannu, MLA and member of the Select Standing Committee on Legislative Offices, as well as Karen Sawchuk, Committee Clerk, attended the 2006 Council on Governmental Ethics Laws (COGEL) Conference in New Orleans, Louisiana, from December 3 to 6, 2006.

The conference program covered election and campaign finance issues ongoing in the United States, Canada, and other jurisdictions, as well as ethics and information access and protection of privacy issues. The emphasis in this year's program was elections, and Alberta was well represented by its Chief Electoral Officer and senior staff from that office.

The keynote speakers for this conference were Mayor C. Ray Nagin, city of New Orleans; Mitchell W. Pearlman, executive director emeritus, Connecticut Freedom of Information Commission; Dr. Hussein Hindawi, chairman of the Iraqi Election Commission; Jeff Fischer, chief of elections for Iraq; and Paula Franzese, Peter W. Rodino professor of law, Seton Hall Law School, New Jersey.

COGEL is an international organization whose primary membership originates in the United States and Canada. Delegates and session participants at the 2006 conference were from the United States, Canada, Mexico, Australia, Britain, Wales and Iraq. Canadian jurisdictions were well represented, and presenters, moderators and panelists included representatives from both federal and provincial-level elections, information and privacy, and ethics offices. The 2007 conference will be returning to Canada for the first time since it was held in Ottawa in 2002. It will be held in Victoria, British Columbia, in September 2007.

Delegates also attended the COGEL annual awards banquet on the final evening of the conference, at which time the annual COGEL Award, presented in recognition of significant, demonstrable and positive contributions to the fields of campaign finance, elections, ethics, freedom of information or lobbying, was presented.

Report by Shiraz Shariff

Six workshops were held during the conference.

1. Strategies in Care and Support of HIV/AIDS Orphans and other Vulnerable Children.

There was consensus that parliamentarians and parliaments have a vital role in the care and support of HIV/AIDS orphans and vulnerable children. It was agreed that parliamentarians have a role as advocates to promote awareness and as legislators to ensure strategies for care and support of orphans and to provide oversight and scrutiny of service providing agencies.

2. Domestic Violence.

Domestic violence, child abuse and abduction were perceived to be a universal phenomenon requiring more firm legislation in place. The workshop expressed a need to reconstitute a better society promoting economic independence of women through education as well as having women and children understand their rights.

3. Transnational Security Threats.

Unregulated migration and cross-border controls has become a concern for many countries since 9/11. A number of examples were cited from various countries' experiences.

4. Climate Change and Desertification.

The workshop dealt with the challenges of climate change, particularly its impact on cold climate areas and low-lying countries.

5. The Role of Parliament in Constitutional Reform.

Parliaments are seen to play an influential role in constitutional reform.

The role of parliaments in constitutional reform also depends upon the reason for reform.

6. The Role of Parliamentarians in Promoting Good Governance through Fiscal Transparency.

The need for good governance was articulated. It was felt parliamentarians' active involvement in ensuring transparent and accountable government institutions benefited their citizens.

Dr. William Shija of Tanzania was elected as the Secretary General of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association. He assumed office as of January 1, 2007. The Association also agreed to meet in India for the 2008 CPA conference.

Following introductory remarks by Michael Eastman, executive director of the Canadian Comprehensive Auditing Foundation (CCAF), was an overview of CCAF research on effectiveness of public accounts committees, facilitated by a panel discussion.

A number of representatives from the provinces and territories joined in the discussion, and you could certainly see the number of differences in the ways that reviews of public accounts are conducted. The biggest variances seem to lie in the kinds of issues each committee is mandated to review, the number of Members sitting on public accounts committees, and the number of committees which meet outside of legislative sessions.

The group reviewed a "Self-Assessment Guide for Public Accounts Committees", prepared by CCAF.

We thought this was a very effective conference from the point of view of learning:

- how different provinces ensure government accountability by reviewing the public accounts and
- how public accounts committees relate to their Auditor General and address/ follow up on issues raised in their Auditors' reports.

We feel that we cannot get away from the partisan review that we have in our system but think it is important for us to move forward. We appreciated the opportunity to attend this worthwhile conference.

Edward William Ewasiuk

September 24, 1933 - April 14, 2006

Mr. Ewasiuk was first elected on May 8, 1986, to represent the constituency of Edmonton Beverly for the New Democratic Party and served until June 15, 1993.

During his term of office Mr. Ewasiuk served on the select standing committees on the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund Act; Law and Regulations; Private Bills; Public Accounts; and Public Affairs.

Frederick Charles Colborne

November 14, 1916 - April 19, 2006

Mr. Colborne was first elected to the Legislature by the servicemen's vote on August 8, 1944, and served until August 17, 1948. He was re-elected on August 17, 1948, and served until July 22, 1971.

During his years of service he represented the air force servicemen as well as the constituencies of Calgary and Calgary Centre for the governing Social Credit Party.

Mr. Colborne served as minister without portfolio from August 2, 1955, to November 29, 1962; as Minister of Public Works from November 30, 1962 to May 26, 1969; and Minister of Municipal Affairs from May 27, 1969, to September 9, 1971.

Mr. Colborne also served on the select standing committees on Agriculture, Colonization, Immigration and Education; Municipal Law; Municipal Law and Law Amendments; Private Bills; Privileges and Elections; Public Accounts; Public Affairs; Agriculture and Education; and Railways, Telephones and Irrigation.

Mr. Colborne served on the special committees on Education Assistance for Dependents of Deceased and Disabled Ex-Service Men; Electoral

Boundaries; Hutterite Colonies; Redistribution/Redistribution Procedure; Rules, Orders and Forms of Procedure; and Workers' Compensation.

Roy Alexander Farran

January 2, 1921 - June 2, 2006

Mr. Farran was first elected on August 30, 1971, to represent the constituency of Calgary-North Hill for the Progressive Conservative Party and served until March 22, 1979.

During his term of office Mr. Farran served as Minister of Telephones and Utilities (March 6, 1973 - April 2, 1975) and Solicitor General (April 3, 1975 - March 22, 1979).

Mr. Farran also served on the standing committees on Public Accounts; Private Bills; Standing Orders and Printing; Law, Law Amendments and Regulations; Public Affairs, Agriculture and Education.

Randolph McKinnon

July 22, 1917 - June 10, 2006

Mr. McKinnon was first elected on June 18, 1959, to represent the constituency of Strathcona-West for the Social Credit Party and served until May 23, 1967.

During his term of office Mr. McKinnon served as Minister of Education (July 31, 1964 - June 28, 1967) as well as on the following standing committees: Agriculture, Colonization, Immigration and Education; Private Bills, Standing Orders and Printing; Public Accounts; Public Affairs, Agriculture and Education; Railways, Telephones and Irrigation.

Arthur Joseph Soetaert

April 14, 1913 - September 14, 2006

Mr. Soetaert was elected on June 29, 1955, to represent the constituency of St. Albert for the Liberal Party and served until June 18, 1959.

During his term of office Mr. Soetaert served on the select standing committees on Agriculture, Colonization, Immigration and Education; Municipal Law; Privileges and Elections; Public Accounts; and Railways, Telephones and Irrigation.

Bryan Melvin Strong

Mr. Strong was elected on May 8, 1986, as the representative for the constituency of St. Albert for the New Democratic Party and served until March 20, 1989.
